



Excerpts from Father Vasilios' recent sermon:

In the parable of the great Banquet, "A man once gave a great banquet and invited many..." What is this 'great banquet' that the master of the house prepared? It is the consensus of the Fathers and the Church that this refers to the Divine Eucharist, the mystery of Holy Communion, the supper that our Lord enacted on Holy Thursday evening. Our Lord by His All Powerful Blessing transformed the bread and wine to become His Body and Blood. He gave his Apostles a command: "Do this in My remembrance. Since the day of Pentecost our Church repeats it at every Divine Liturgy. "Take, eat, this is My Body. Drink of it, this is my Blood" and when everything is ready, the Priest calls out to the people: "With the fear of God, and Faith and with love draw near." These words are the same that we hear in this parable: "Come, for all things are now ready." All Orthodox Christians are invited. "Drink of this all of you..."

But what is the reality? What is the response to the Royal Invitation? Many present various excuses like the people in this Gospel parable. Even though they were invited they rejected the invitation. The excuses continue today. 'I am not worthy. That is why I receive 2 or 3 times per year. Anyway, that's what my mother taught me'...there are many excuses. First of all, no one is ever worthy to receive the Body and Blood of Christ. It is a gift from God.

But there is a solution—regardless of whether it's from ignorance, or negligence or certain sins which make us feel uncomfortable to receive often. The solution is a sincere repentance and confession to a Priest. Then we will be in a condition to receive at practically every Divine Liturgy. We need only prepare ourselves, the night before we receive we remain quite with our inner reflection and prayer. Then, in the morning we are to receive, we should not eat anything. Of course it is imperative to take medicines, so allowances can be made.

Receiving only a few times a year does not make us more worthy and acceptable to The Lord. And, let us all participate in the Fasts that our Church has established. It will vary somewhat for every person depending on health issues. Let us follow the fasts of the year as much as we can, but remember that those fasts are not directly associated with receiving Holy Communion. They are ascetical fasts to help us in our struggle to lead a spiritual life, toward our repentance and the avoidance of sin.

The deprivation of Holy Communion is regressive for the spiritual life, There is no true spiritual life without participation in the Life Giving Cup. The Lord said it plainly, "Unless you eat of the flesh of the Son of Man and drink His blood you have no life in you." - You are spiritually dead. We should feel honored and grateful to be able to participate frequently in that Great Banquet.

How? With love, and hope in the resurrection. We may pray the "Prayer for every departed person", which is in any Orthodox Psalter (book of Psalms), or pray more simply saying;

"Lord Jesus Christ, have mercy on Thy servant, (N)"
